I have six locks on my door all in a row. When I go out, I lock every other one. I figure no matter how long somebody stands there picking the locks, they're always locking three.




Honors English II: students are studying exposition essays - classify and divide and comparison contrast. They are also learning some basic research skills on the new chrome books.







Semester 6 – We are drawings objects using 3D modeling and revisiting working drawings in orthographic projection.




Freshman students are completing their first independent project by constructing welded saw horses.


