## Title I Notice

As a school-wide Title I program we are required, at the beginning of every school year, to tell parents they have a right to request the following information about the professional qualifications of their children’s teachers.

In addition, USD 506 must notify parents if their child has been assigned, or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks— by a teacher who is not highly qualified.

It is not the intent of USD 506 to use teacher data as a means of drawing attention to teachers or create questions as to the competency of a school’s teaching staff. Rather, it is our intent to provide this data as a means of working together in upgrading teaching skills and improving instruction.

## Bus Transportation Corner

There were 4,043 bus drivers during the 2019-2020 school year who transported 223,705 Kansas students more than 60.5 million miles. In order to honor their dedication and expertise, Kansas Gov. Laura Kelly designated Oct. 21 as School Transportation Day. The day coincides with National School Bus Safety Week, which is Oct. 19-23. National School Bus Safety Week takes place the third full week of October each year. It is designed to promote school bus safety.

On behalf of the USD 506 drivers I want to say “Thank you” to the 506 students that ride our buses. Many of our drivers received cards and “goodies” during National Bus Safety Week from our riders. We appreciate the student’s gratitude and most of all appreciate that 99% of them do an excellent job of riding the bus and following the rules.
